Faith versus Fanaticism

Radical Islamist groups who make news every day are motivated by a desire to bring the world under a repressively fundamentalist brand of Islam. They believe that this is the will of G-d, and that this was, in fact, what Muhammad and his successors were doing during their century-and-a-half march to empire. They see themselves as completing Muhammad's march. To this end, they exploit, inflame and co-opt any political cause or social unrest; they train and dispatch suicide bombers; they use civilian populations as human shields; and wherever they succeed, they replace existing governments with repressively fundamentalist theocracies.

In short, radical Islamist groups are religious fanatics. Before we talk about what fanaticism is, we need to be clear about what it is not. A Jew who lives a life of religious observance is not fanatic. A Christian who informs all his major life-decisions with Christian values is not fanatic. A Muslim who fasts during Ramadan and prays five times a day is not fanatic. Fanaticism is not the same as intense commitment.

Fanaticism is a particular form of commitment: one that cannot tolerate other forms of commitment. If I think that you are mistaken in your views, I am not a fanatic. If, however, I can neither tolerate your views nor permit them to exist, I am a fanatic. And if I use violence to prevent you from maintaining and advocating your views, I am a violent fanatic.

Religion is driven by passion. It is passion that impels us to do good even when there is no "percentage" in it; to pray simply for the sake of being with G-d; to love with no expectation of reward; and to strive, against practical counsel, to improve the world.

But if intellect devoid of passion is cold, passion devoid of intellect is a flame out of control. Passion must be carefully directed lest it run wild and devour everything it touches. When passion passes its boundaries, it becomes fanaticism.

Our Sages, of blessed memory, understood this clearly. In the Talmud, they discuss the biblical case of Pinchas, who summarily executed Zimri, a tribal chieftain engaged in public cult-prostitution. In so doing, he instantly ended the people's defection to idolatry. G-d exonerated Pinchas because he "turned back My wrath from the Israelites by displaying among them his passion for Me, so that I did not wipe out the Israelites people in My passion" (Numbers 25.11).

Did G-d's ratification of Pinchas' act mean that the Torah generally approves of zealots taking the law into their own hands? Our Sages (Sanhedrin 82a) reply as follows:

If [a zealot] comes to take counsel [on whether to slay the transgressor], we do not instruct him to do so. What is more, had Zimri separated [from the cult-prostitute] and Pinchas slain him, Pinchas would have been executed on his account;

and had Zimri turned upon Pinhas and slain him, he would not have been executed, since Pinhas was a pursuer [and might therefore legally be slain in self-defense].

The summary action of a zealot may be justified only after the fact, and only in a very narrow window of legitimacy. The burden of the law rests not on the zealot's victim, however provocative his behavior may have been, but on the zealot. The question is not whether the zealot is a role model; the question is whether he can even be exonerated. It took a direct pronouncement by G-d to exonerate Pinhas. While there is limited room in Jewish law for extraordinary acts of zealotry, there is no room for vigilante rule.

Some halachically committed Jews have nevertheless taken it upon themselves to carry out what they considered G-d's retribution.

The late Baruch Goldstein, who gunned down some thirty Muslims at prayer in the Tomb of the Patriarchs, and Yigal Amir, who assassinated Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, are prime examples. Such people act on the conviction that they are doing the will of G-d, but they have crossed the line separating faith from fanaticism.

Two different Hebrew terms describe religious zeal: *z'rizut* and *kin'ah*. *Z'rizut* means eagerness, and *kin'ah* means zealotry. Someone who performs a mitzvah joyfully and at the earliest possible moment is acting out of *z'rizut*. Someone who, like Pinhas, takes "impassioned action" in G-d's behalf is acting out of *kin'ah*. There is a critical difference between them. *Kin'ah* can start out with good intentions but end up causing evil results. *Z'rizut*, on the other hand, can lead to freedom from sin (Talmud, Avodah Zarah 20b).

Religion can be a powerful motivation either for doing good, or for doing evil in the name of good. It depends on which type of zeal one brings to it. We do well to follow the Psalmist's teaching, "Turn from evil and do good; seek peace and pursue it" (Psalms 34.15).

The stories of Alan Isler – read in December – were fascinating and wonderfully written with seriousness and a dash of humor. Basically, Isler's theme was "the Jew in the Gentile World" and he perfectly captured that dilemma with its many nuances.

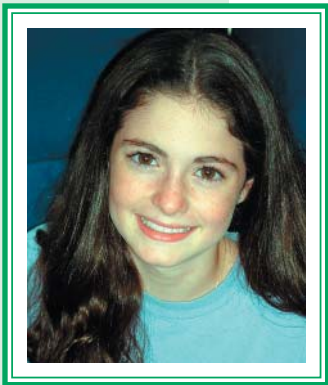

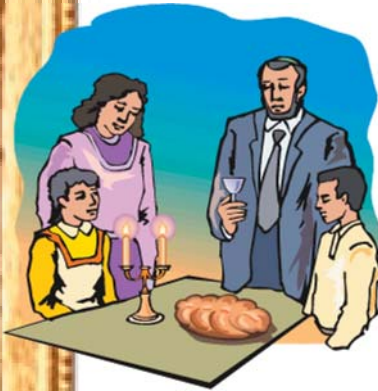
